As the sun with its golden rays was kissing the shining dome of our church temple of Sts. Peter and Paul, anticipation filled the air as one after the other soup chefs were bringing their prized soup creations into the church hall kitchen. This Sunday was special; it marked the day of our muchanticipated "Soup-er Bowl Sunday" event. Our parish had joined hands once again to raise funds for the soup kitchen in Kiev, providing not just nourishment for our parishioners and guests, but also hope to those affected by the ongoing turmoil in Ukraine. As the Liturgy was concluding, the aroma of simmering vegetables, spices,

and hearty broths traveled through the air, drawing families and friends together in the celebration of warmth and parish community. Our talented chefs, each with their own secret recipes, presented 23 soups for the enjoyment of many. Each pot steaming with flavor told a story of resilience, culture, and compassion.

There was a huge variety of soups, from aromatic red borscht, its vibrant red hue a reminder of the beetroot-rich lands of Ukraine; a creamy mushroom soup, rich with local wild mushrooms; and a spicy Tom Yum that warmed both body and soul to Ukrainian green borsch made with green sorrel and chicken reminded many of their childhood in Ukraine and many others.

There was a suggested donation to participate at the event, but many gave above and beyond, overwhelmed by the sense of purpose behind the flavors. Children giggled as they slurped up noodles from a savory chicken soup, while their parents chatted with parish family friends, sharing laughter and stories, fostering connections that transcended the issues of the day. For many, this was more than just an event; it felt like a family reunion, a heartfelt gesture reaching out to others halfway across the world. As guests savored their soups, stories began to emerge about the soup kitchens in Ukraine as well as how the civilian population of Ukraine is helping soldiers on the front lines with food, clothing, and medical supplies.

Our parish has become more than a place to worship and to enjoy a good meal afterword; it has become a haven where families find safety, a sense of community amid chaos, and the loving embrace of true Christians of the Orthodox Faith. Each dollar raised that day would provide a day's worth of meals for those in need, a small beacon of light in dark times.

As the event wrapped up, and the last bowls were enjoyed, community members began to clean up, but not before taking a moment to reflect on the day's impact. The laughter, the food, the warmth — it was a reminder that even amid hardship, we could come together, share our blessings, and uplift others. As the sun was getting ready to over the towering trees of forest preserves, people slowly made their way home, clutching their empty soup pots as tokens of a day well spent. The funds raised far exceeded expectations, and everyone left with a sense of fulfillment, knowing they had helped contribute to something bigger than themselves. The soup kitchen in Kiev would thrive a little longer, fueled by the compassion of strangers united by a

single meal. It was a day of expression of hope, resilience, and a heartfelt reminder that together, we could create change, one bowl of soup at a time.

I want to extend my heartfelt thanks to our soup chefs for their incredible support in sharing their delicious soups for our fundraiser. Thank you to all of those who provided utensils, paper supplies, snacks and desserts for this event. Thank you to all of those who stayed and cleaned up. Your generosity not only enriched our event but also played a crucial role in helping people in Ukraine. We truly appreciate your kindness and dedication to making a difference in the lives of those in need. Thank you for being a vital part of this initiative! Let us remember that we are all interconnected, and even the smallest act of kindness can create ripples of hope far beyond our reach.

Recaps of Sunday February 9, 2025 *Primary and Intermediate classes*

Who Was Saint Valentine & Why Do We Celebrate a Day Named for Him?

That was the question posed to the students in Miss Faith's & Miss Karen's combined classes. St. Valentine was a Roman priest and doctor who lived in Italy in the 3rd century AD. Centuries later his story inspired the creation of the secular holiday of St. Valentine's Day. He was persecuted for his Christian beliefs, imprisoned and sentenced to die for performing weddings during a time when new marriages were outlawed. While in jail he befriended and cured the blindness of his jailer's daughter. Before he was executed, he sent a letter to the child and signed it "from your Valentine." It wasn't until the Middle Ages, that February 14th was the date set aside by Pope Gelasius to honor his memory. Sooo....Is St. Valentine a Roman Catholic or Orthodox Saint? Both...for many years both faiths recognized him as a saint. That has not changed for Orthodox Christians. For us St. Valentine's Day is most fully understood as a celebration of romantic love and of God's love. St. Valentine was willing to sacrifice his life to marry young couples through the blessing of God's love. Demonstrating our love for God through our relationships with our families and communities, is a way of life that is at the heart of Orthodoxy. By living a life following Christ, Saint Valentine shared this fundamental truth of Orthodox Christianity with the world, one that is more beautiful and lasts longer than flowers and cards—it is eternal.*

The lesson also involved a craft befitting of the holiday. The children created thumbprint heart shaped glass magnets to share with loved ones. A special shout-out to Ryan S. for helping with the craft and for Faith's mother, Priscilla, who arrived just in time and jumped in to help with the clean-up. The message of St. Valentine was clearly shown today!
